Can we PLEASE go hunting for iron? Posts: 360	DUmb mistake on my part. Please dont make the same one. I didnt put my goggles on because I was "just going to quickly add one pan to my lye tub." I eased it in fine and was about to shut the lid and it settled with the other pans inside causing it to "plop" and a splash came straight up and into my face hitting me in both eyes. I didn't rub them even though it burrned. instead kept my eyes open, ran to my sink immediately begain putting hands full of water in my eyes. I keep an emergency eye wash kit in a known place where I can feel and find it. I took it and used it for about 10 more minutes then went immediately to the Emergency room.(I work at the same hospital)	
	I can only describe what happened for the next 2 1/2 hours as being a battlefield terrorist at Guantonimo bay(SP?). Pure hell and water tourture, but absolutely neccesary. 6 liters of water squirted at fairly good force dirrectly into each eye while a tech and an RN held my eyes open. It took about 5 minutes per bottle. lying on my back lots of it ran down my nostrils giving me a drownning feeling. After the 12 liters of squirting I was lying in water, soaked, as was the bed.	
	Then came phase two. Some torture device they refered to as a "morgan Lens". It is a half spherical shaped plastic cup they stuck over my eye ball with a catheter like tube comming out of the center and up to an IV bag. I cant begin to describe how "uncomfortable" the process of installing these things was. They ought to ditch the waterboarding down in cuba and switch to putting in Morgan lenses. They would tell us anything we want to know. Anywhoanother 6 liters in IV's each had to drip through the catheter and the lenses till finished About an 1 1/2 hours while these things were stuck to my eyes and I had the uncontrolable urge to snatch them out the whole time. In between all these steps they were sticking a paper strip to my bare burned eyball to check the PH. I learned that Lye is a base, not an acid. which is worse because it settles between the skin Layers and will come back or eat perferations through the eye itself.	
	That great deal I got on that last find was just deminished by an ER visit bill.	
	I was very lucky in this case thanks to my immediate actions after the fact, a great ER staff that had dealt with this issue before and the man upstairs. I have another followup appt this friday with the eye doc, but things are looking good at this point in time.	
	Moral of the storyWEAR GOGGLES when fooling with lye no matter how simple the task. Have them on before the lid comes off the tank. If you have to leave them on the top of the tank so you will have to pick them up first.

I wear glasses and a hat basically all the time to minimize that possibility. That also reduces the chance of a direct splash of lye. My lye tank is outside. I allways have a turned-on hose with pistol grip set on spray next to the lye tank, before I take the top off of the lye tank. I'm about 3 seconds away from being able to flush my eyes any time the top is off the lye tank.

	Jeffs idea of a running water hose standing by is an excellent suggestion also. I had to make it back inside through my overcrowded garage to the kitchen sink for the initial flush before getting to the eye kit. These kits are available at any drug store or walmart and are very cheap to have on hand considering the risk not only from lye but other objects such as lawn mower debri getting in there. That was a situation I had before which prompted me keeping one on hand. It flushed it right out.
	Looks like folks read my post and it drew attention to the possibilities.That was my intention so hopefully it wouldt happen to anyone on here. Thanks for all the concern and well wishes. Great people here.
